"Freemasonry has to be a Quality Experience"

In the Oxford Dictionary Quality is defined as "the degree of excellence" or "general excellence". To my mind, it should be synonymous to Freemasonry, for if our Order is to attract the respect that its principles so richly deserve we really do have to make absolutely certain that every single candidate, without exception, has a top quality experience. We have to ensure that every single member has confidence in the manner in which his Brethren apply their principles. We have to ensure that every single Masonic family member is enriched by the positive impact that Freemasonry has on their lives. We have to make certain that every person doing business with or interacting with a Freemason feels suitably comforted by the experience. To really achieve our ideals, in every conceivable manner, Freemasonry has to be a quality experience.

But what does this all really mean and what sort of expectations are we imposing on our members?

Let's start off by sharing a few quotations.

* The quality of a person's life is in direct proportion to their commitment to excellence, regardless of their chosen field of endeavour. Vince Lombardi
* Quality is never an accident. It's always the result of intelligent effort. John Ruskin

The way I see it, the new applicant should be exposed to a quality experience right from the time that he first makes contact with us. Our Brethren need to be properly prepared to answer his questions and to suitably inform him about our Grand Lodge and the Order overall. The application process has to be clear and professional. The forms and material presented to the candidate must reflect the high standards that we set and he must be kept regularly updated on the progress being made in processing his application.

Clearly, his initiation is likely to leave a very long-lasting impression on our new member. Remember, "you never get a second chance to make a good first impression" and it is absolutely essential that this working be of a high standard. We simply can't have Brethren wandering around the Temple reading badly out of ritual books - it's the candidate's evening and he's entitled to a Quality experience! The festive board must be well prepared for and properly run and the toasts presented with sincerity.


These same principles, incidentally, must apply through all of our new Brother's degrees and we should also take note that there is never, ever a moment when it is in order for a senior Brother to start shouting instructions or corrections at more junior Brethren during the course of the ceremony. If errors need to be corrected, this should be done after the working in a discreet and inoffensive manner. It's the candidate's special night, Brethren, and we must always keep this in the front of our minds.

Within the Lodge we need to make very sure that we promote the principle of Brotherly Love and do whatever we can to ensure that there is always the harmony and ambiance which so enriches our time together. Remember, Brethren, that we promised to treat others as we wished them to treat us and we need to make very sure that we live by this principle.

Freemasonry is, above all things, a way of life. For it to have any real meaning, we have to live by the principles that we teach and promote and be an example to others by the manner in which we conduct ourselves. Should we do so, we will inevitably enrich the lives of our family, our business colleagues and, indeed, everybody that we come into contact with.

I have often heard it said that if the whole world lived by Masonic principles, most of the conflicts would disappear. I sincerely believe this but it starts with us, Brethren, and by our conduct we have to set the standards that we'd wish others to aspire to.

Most of our Brethren are aware that Freemasonry was introduced to South Africa with the consecration of Lodge de Goede Hoop in Cape Town on 2 May 1772. This was under the Grand East of the Netherlands and, for the next 190 years all our Lodges were Netherlandic. Over the next few issues we will introduce you to the extraordinary leaders - the South African based Deputy Grand Masters of the Netherlands.

Remarkably, there were only ever 9 of them and they served between 4 and 43 years each - an average of 18 years. They were special men and made a great impact on the development of our Freemasonry and of our country, South Africa.
