I'm not against but!

As several of you are already aware, I recently went to Ouagadougou (Wagadoogoo) in Burkina Faso to attend the Installation of their new Grand Master. Despite some logistical challenges which resulted in such situations as my spending a long night in a very run-down Ethiopian hotel, trying to pass through customs into the wrong country, claiming an unbooked seat on a hotel bus and arriving at the Grand Banquet inappropriately dressed, it really was a memorably enjoyable and rewarding weekend. I have known the new Grand Master, MW Bro Alain Coffe, for a while now and both like and admire him.

Before I went to Burkina Faso, of course, I was reminded by a number of people about the ISIS attack which had seen 40 people killed in Ouagadougou in January this year. The terrible truth, though, is that terrorist attacks occur all over the world nowadays and we cannot just stop everything as we succumb to their threats. In my experience, countries that have been subjected to terrorism become extremely vigilant about preventing a recurrence and, in truth, I really do believe that I'm at greater risk travelling to the airport! Sadly, the fatalities in the January attack had also included the Grand Lodge of Burkina Faso's new pro Grand Master, so they really felt the pain.

There were 13 Grand Lodges in attendance over the weekend and these were ourselves, Burkina Faso, France, Italy, Liberia, Gabon, Mali, Guinea, Togo, Congo, Ghana, Cote d'Ivoire and Benin. The Brethren present also included 7 Grand Masters.

Burkina Faso's population is, of course, almost entirely black and they talk mainly French. I was further advised that roughly 50% of them are Moslem, 40% Christian and 10% other. For me, of course, being visible was easy! It's worth mentioning, though, that while many of them spoke little or no English, they always managed to include me and I participated in some most interesting discussions about Freemasonry.

At the end of the Installation ceremony, the new Grand Master welcomed each Grand Lodge on an individual basis and I was duly called upon to respond.

After extending our congratulations, I continued by noting that I was a white, English speaking male from South Africa who had been brought up in a

Christian home. I was clearly very different from almost every other Brother in the hall (and there were about 300 of us). Despite this I had enjoyed the warmth and love that only Freemasonry really brings. I was accepted simply as a man and as a Brother and I observed that, if only all men could apply and live by our principles, most of the conflicts world's would simply not exist. I sat down to some very warm applause,



which sort of threw me as I *with MW Bro Alain Coffe* didn't think that most of the Brethren present would understand my English - but they certainly had.

Exploring this further, Brethren, one of Freemasonry's greatest strengths is our practice of Tolerance. We live in a world, and indeed a country, where sensitivities are high. Where there is a very strong, often violent, reaction to thoughtless comments that are published or voiced. But the truth is that we, as Freemasons, should never ever be drawn into any of these situations, because bigotry in any form is diagonally opposed to our core Masonic beliefs.

And yet I still hear people who feel that it's in order to offer a highly bigoted opinion with an introductory preface of "I'm not against" and they will then specify a particular religion, race, language group, nationality, political party, employment group or any other identifiable segmentation, then it's "but" and they include every single being who falls into that category as they set about destroying its credibility.

Brethren this is not Masonic and it's not okay. We judge men based on their conduct as men, not on their background, their upbringing or their beliefs. As Freemasons, let us always bear this in mind! Let our contribution to our country and society be the example that we set as to how good men really should behave.

Lodge Westerford's Installation

On Thursday 5th May Wor Bro Graham Symons was installed as the new Master of Lodge Westerford. Assistant PGM Wor Bro Evangelos Doucas performed the Installation, while the Board of Installed Masters was attended to by Wor Bro Louis van der Linde. In both cases their work was of a very high standard.

Initially, the Chapter will be strongly supported by the Provincial Grand Chapter and is planned to fill a "Royal Arch vacuum" and provide a "local" Far East Rand Chapter. The Chapter meets on the 2nd Tuesday of February, April, July and October.

Installation of Lodge Flaming Star No 139.

On Monday 18 April, a Grand Lodge delegation led by RW Bro Dave Duncan OSM visited Flaming Star to witness Bro Patrick Wanketa being installed as the new



Presiding Master in the presence of more than 75 Brethren. Patrick is the second initiate of the Lodge to be installed in the Chair since its resurrection as an active Lodge in 2010. During this

Wor Bro Achilles Katumbay period of development, the Lodge has been supported by both Grand and Provincial Grand Lodge Officers and these were thanked in Wor Bro Achilles Katumbay's excellent valedictory report in which he also highlighted the very busy year experienced by the Brethren. He reported that the ritual work had remained of a very high standard and that Members of Lodge Flaming Star were regularly assisting other Lodges with the performance of their rituals. He congratulated Lodge member Bro G Ngouessy-Guibinga, for being one of the first recipients of a Ritual Excellence Program award. He stressed that the philosophy of the Lodge is that our Freemasonry must be fun and that the social life of the Lodge is just as important as the labours in the Temple. A very successful outing to the Barnyard Theatre raised over R20,000 for the Lodge.

The installation Ceremony was well conducted and with great dignity by Wor Bro Gavin Macintosh and a large team of Provincial Officers.

In his address Wor Bro Patrick Wanketa

detailed his working plans for the year and if achieved, the year will be even busier than that iust past. Α number of new candidates have been identified and the focus will remain on high ritual quality at the respective

RW Bro Conrad Christian Silberbauer

1904 saw RW Bro C C Silberbauer installed as Deputy Grand Master, a position he then held for some 40 years. Like so many of his predecessors, he was a member of Lodge de Goede Hoop and a well respected lawyer. He is described as being "a man of very large heart, always kindly, tolerant and tactful". He was recognised as a wise administrator who paid attention to detail and made very few mistakes.

Shortly after he had settled into his new position, the Provincial Grand Lodge of the Transvaal was formed and his term of office saw the opening of a large number of new Netherlandic Lodges, some 18 of which are still active today. Examples include Diamond (22), Senekal (27), Neerlandia (31), Fidelity (34), Star of the East (28), de Voortrekker (41), Marina (25), Bellville (42), Westerford (43), Jacob de Mist (44) and de Goede Verwachting (23).

He was known as the Masonic poet and, together with his brother C Fred Silberbauer, was a highly accomplished Masonic writer. Between them they penned many articles and hymns which are still regularly used today.

Tradition has it, incidentally, that Silberbauer

always attended formal Masonic occasions in full court dress – tailcoat, lace shirtfront, knee breeches, silk stockings and silver buckled shoes. If you stand at the entrance to the main de Goede Hoop Temple facing East, an original painting of Silberbauer is to be found on the left hand wall of the outer vestibule.



It is also an interesting fact that, approximately 25 years ago, his 2 great grandsons were concurrently the Worshipful Masters of Lodge de Goede Hoop and Lodge de Goede Trouw.

Coenie was one of the greatest supporters of Grand Lodge and was only a couple of months away from qualifying for his 50 year service award.

A Masonic funeral will take place at noon at the Central East Rand Temple on Monday 30 May.
