How Do YOU Make People Feel?

Over the past couple of years I have made a point of reading Prof Jonathan Jansen's weekly article in my daily paper. He is, of course, the Rector and Vice Chancellor of the University of the Free State but, despite his impressive list of academic distinctions, he has the ability to get right to the heart of any issues that he explores and is able to convey his messages in a very uncomplicated, readable manner.

Anyway, he was recently asked to speak to a school audience about his "philosophy of education". As always, he provides some really interesting insights on the subject but, for the purpose of this article, I would like to share just the one paragraph.

Jansen says "I believe that the most important subject taught is yourself. Long after children forget what you taught them about parts of speech in an English classroom or irrational numbers in a mathematics lesson, they will remember who you were as a professional educator - that you were disciplined, taught with passion, took a personal interest in every child, wrote a compliment on a test paper, made much of a birthday, grieved with them when a relative died, and took them all for ice-cream one hot summer's day. What makes the subject stick is who you are as a person and as a professional. That is what draws young people to become teachers themselves."

On a similar note, I recently came across a very relevant quotation from Maya Angelou who said "I've learned that people will forget what you said, people will forget what you did, but people will never forget how you made them feel."

We, as Freemasons, adhere to a philosophy that is based on truth, morality and brotherly love. We believe in and promote charity and endeavour to do what we can to assist those less fortunate than ourselves. Our Order promulgates a total commitment to practising family values and encourages Brethren to fully support their own personal religious beliefs. We really do have all the ingredients required to create an environment where we can leave people feeling really good about the time they spend with us - and yet so often we don't. Why might this be?

Why is it that all too often a new Apprentice feels let down by his experience or the inexperienced Worshipful Master feels unjustly undermined by the very Brethren who he was expecting to support him? Are our principles not working - or are we sometimes insensitive in the way in which we try to apply them?

I would suggest that, in far too many cases, it is the manner in which we project our message rather than the message's content. Perhaps we need to give more thought as to how people may feel about how we convey our message to them. Are our criticisms, for example, thoughtful, constructive and kind. Do we try to remember that we too were once that new Apprentice or Worshipful Master and try to treat them as we would have liked to have been treated. Can we, in good conscience, claim to be "ever forbearing to the faults and frailties of a Brother".

A few days ago the world lost one of its true sporting icons - Muhammad Ali. In the aftermath of his passing, much was written about his life and opinions and he certainly was a man of great substance. At some stage he had taken time out to document the man he wanted to be remembered as and I could not help but be moved by his thoughts. In Ali's words "I would like to be remembered as a man ... who was humorous and treated everyone right. As a man who never looked down on those who looked up to him. And who helped as many people as he could. As a man who stood up for his beliefs, no matter what. As a man who tried to unite all humankind through faith and love."

Brethren, I really believe that it is the duty of every single Freemason to do what they can to enrich the lives of those with whom they come into contact. Not to simply provide guidance, direction and assistance, but to endeavour to do so in such a way that the recipient feels uplifted by the experience. It's not always easy, Brethren, and it's not a skill that most of us naturally have, but it's another step in our efforts to shape and smooth the rough ashlar that symbolises our progress as men and as Freemasons.

Let us never look down on those who look up to us and always remember that it's how we make people feel that really leaves the most lasting impression.

Comp Tom du Toit, reviewed the Division's successes and commented on the favourable growth in members that had been achieved.



Farewell to RW Bro Doug Kirton.

It is with great sadness that we have to report that the highly respected Master of Lodge Isandlwana, RW Bro Doug Kirton has passed to the Eternal East after a hard fought fight with cancer.



RW Bro Doug Kirton was recently installed as the District Grand Master of the UGLE's KZN Division. He was also the Presiding Master of the South Africa Lodge (UGLE) in London. The KZ Natal Freemasons are a small but close knit group of Brethren. The Constitutions work

together in great harmony and assist each other in various ways to promote Freemasonry in the region. Bro Doug Kirton was a very active founder member of Lodge Isandlwana and was its second Master.

Although unusually talented, Doug was an extremely humble man and was always more interested in promoting the image of Freemasonry than personal glory. Of course, glory always follows when you are successful in achieving a common good.

Lodge Isandlwana will conduct a Lodge of Mourning on Saturday 2^{nd} July in his memory at the NMR Temple Complex.

M W Bros John Rose and Graham Botha

The last two Deputy Grand Masters of the Netherlands were also the only ones to play a direct part in the formation of the Grand Lodge of South Africa.

In 1945 Col John George Rose DSO was installed as the Deputy Grand Master. He was a quiet, humble man who had spent his business career as an analytical chemist. He had a distinguished military record having served in the Anglo Boer War and in both the 1^{st} and 2^{nd} World Wars. He was a distinguished sportsman and, as a young man, excelled in both cycling and rowing - he held the



world 1 hour cycling record. He was also Chairman of the Royal Automobile Club of South Africa.

Rose was a member of de Goede Hoop and, in 1946, presented them with a banner which is still in use today. He consecrated new temples in Bellville and Bredasdorp and after the formation of the GLSA was honoured with the rank of Past Grand Master.

In 1957, Lt Col Colin Graham Botha was installed as the last Deputy Grand Master National of the Grand Lodge of the Netherlands. Botha, a Lawyer



by background, had established and been the much respected Master of the National Archives and a historical writer of note. He also used his skills as an archivist to recover many of our historical records and was a highly regarded leader by our Sister Constitutions.

It was during Botha's term of office, of course, that the misguided

efforts of the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of the Netherlands to bring about unity in Europe in the post World War II years, saw the Grand Lodges of England, Ireland and Scotland threatening to sever their ties with that of the Netherlands. For South Africa's Netherlandic Lodges this would have been disastrous. As a result it was decided to separate from the Grand Lodge of the Netherlands and form the Grand Lodge of South Africa. Lt Col Botha was installed as the first Grand Master!

Botha, as with all of his predecessors, belonged to Lodge de Goede Hoop and the Lodge still proudly uses 2 silver collection plates which he presented to them after 50 years as a member of the Lodge.
