Avoid Living a Life Regretted!

I was recently reminded about a letter that Apple founder Steve Jobs was purported to have written on his death bed. Jobs was a man who had been adopted at a very young age and who displayed an abnormal flair for electronics. He got together with Stephen Wozniak and, after Jobs had dropped out of University, the pair of them started the amazing Apple Computers journey. While there is much debate about the authenticity of this letter, it does serve well as a basis for my article. Jobs' life had its ups and downs. He was, however, a major contributor to world technological progress and his death from cancer at 56 years was a real setback.

"I have reached the pinnacle of success in business. In the eyes of others, my life has been the symbol of success. However, apart from my work, I have little joy. Finally, my wealth and fame is simply a fact to which I am accustomed. At this time, lying on the hospital bed and remembering all my life, I realise that all the accolades and riches of which I was once so proud, have become insignificant with my imminent death. In the dark, when I look at green lights of the artificial respiration equipment and feel the buzz of their mechanical sounds, I can feel the breath of my approaching death looming over me.

Only now do I understand that once you accumulate enough money for the rest of your life, you have to pursue objectives that are not related to fame and wealth. It should be something more important. For example, stories of love, art, dreams of my childhood. No, stop pursuing wealth alone, it can only make a person into a twisted being, just like me.

God has made us one way and we can feel the love in the heart of each of us, not illusions built by fame or money. I cannot take them with me. I can only

take the memories that were strengthened by love. This is the true wealth that will follow and accompany me, will give me strength and light to go ahead.

Love can travel thousands of miles and so life has no limits. Move to where you want to go. Strive to reach the goals you want to achieve. Everything is in your heart and in your hands.

What is the world's most expensive bed? The hospital bed. You, if you have money, can hire someone to drive your car, but you cannot hire someone to take over your illness that is killing you. Material things lost can be found. But the one thing you can never find when you lose it, is life. Whatever stage of life we are at right now, at the end we will have to face the day when the curtain falls.

Treasure love for your family, love for your spouse, love for your friends. Treat yourself well and always cherish others."

While Steve Jobs was not, to my knowledge, a Freemason, so much of what is referred to in his letter is in line with our own Masonic teaching. He, for example, firmly believed in the immortality of the soul.

In his letter Jobs draws our attention to his sudden realisation that, at the end of his life's journey, he had all too often focused on those things which he now found to have been of less importance. Perhaps, looking at it in another way, he had simply not focused enough on those really important issues. There are so many things that he would have done differently.

I am always intrigued when somebody declares that, if they were to have their life again, they wouldn't change a thing. I would. I'd change so many things. Not the really important ones such as my wonderful wife or the family we are so proud of, or my decision to become a Freemason. I'd certainly, however, change some of the decisions that I have made which have negatively impacted on those I love or my thoughtless deeds or words which have hurt people near and dear to me. I'd change them all but, of course, I can't!

To me, the saddest thing about Jobs letter, is that he appears to have only found the time to evaluate his life when he was on his death-bed - and it was then too late to do very much about it. In my view we should be continually assessing our progress, examining our actions and endeavouring to shape and smooth the rough ashlars which symbolise our lives.

Each and every one of us has been blessed with just one life. It is up to us to make the most of it, to look forward and strive to grow ever more perfect, and to leave a legacy which, at the end of our life's journey, we can proudly present to our Maker.

It is further declared that any Grand Lodge who digresses or impedes upon these universally accepted qualifications for candidacy into this honoured institution, may risk the good standing and recognition currently enjoyed with this Grand Lodge."

The Birth of the Grand Lodge of South Africa

It is sometimes amusing to watch our different Divisions each trying to show how they are the closest to our Sister Constitutions. The reality is that we all have very strong relationships - and we always have had! It was because of this that the GLSA was formed.

It all came about in the early 1960s. We were, at the time, part of the Grand Lodge of the Netherlands who, in the aftermath of World War II, sought to regularise the relationships within a group of European Grand Lodges. This group was popularly known as the Luxemburg Convention and MW Bro Davidson, the Grand Master of the Netherlands, was their spokesman. A problem arose when France's interpretations of the basic Masonic landmarks did not, in the United Grand Lodge of England's opinion, give proper recognition to the 3 great lights or pay suitable reverence to a Supreme Being or the Volume of Sacred Law.

The whole situation was complicated by some most unfortunate comments made by Davidson and his apparent willingness to recognise France. It quickly became apparent that, should Netherlands give formal recognition to France, there was a very real chance of the United Grand Lodge of England suspending their recognition of the Grand Lodge of the Netherlands. As far as the Netherlandic Lodges in South Africa were concerned, this would have been disastrous.

In South Africa the four Constitutions worked extremely closely and many of the Freemasons active at the time were members of more than a single Constitution. Any suspension of the Netherlands would automatically include their South African Lodges - and this simply wasn't an acceptable scenario.

In an exchange of letters between Davidson and RW Bro Graham Botha, local Deputy Grand Master of the Netherlands, Davidson acknowledged the very close relationships which existed between the Constitutions in South Africa and suggested that it might be appropriate for the Netherlandic Lodges in South Africa to form their own independent Grand Lodge.

Botha and his two Provincial Grand Masters, Chris de Wet and Eddie Conradie, made their way to Europe where they met with all the relevant players and got the support of the home Grand Lodges to pursue the establishment of the Grand Lodge of South Africa.

While the initiative inevitably met with some resistance from a number of South African based Lodges, the principle was finally carried and work began on preparing for the consecration. With certain defined conditions in place, the support of the Sister Constitutions was secured and they then played a leading role in launching the new Grand Lodge. As an example, RW Bro Thomas Cranstoun-Day, the long serving Cape Town based District Grand Master of the English Constitution, played a significant role in the drafting of the new Grand Lodge's Constitution.

The Grand Lodge of South Africa was formally consecrated on 22nd April 1961. Lt-Col Graham Botha was the 1st Grand Master, Christiaan de Wet the Deputy and Eddie Conradie the Assistant.

Almoner's Corner


