Freemasonry - an International Brotherhood

This article was written at Istanbul airport while waiting for my flight back to Cape Town after a most interesting Masonic weekend attending the Grand Lodge of Portugal's 25th anniversary celebrations. I thought that I'd just share a few thoughts with you based on my recent Masonic experiences.

I arrived in Lisbon on Friday at lunchtime, with my first function being that evening's cocktail party and dinner. It was there that we renewed old friendships and established some new ones. There were some 40 Lodges present at the celebrations and, while some of them really don't talk much English, most of them do and it is extremely enlightening listening to the challenges our Brethren have to face and their approaches to handling them. The reality is that we all subscribe to the same Masonic principles, even if we sometimes vary in our approach to promoting them.

I shared Friday evening with the Past Grand Master of Utah, the Past Deputy Grand Master of India, the Grand Master of Israel and various European Grand Masters. I also shared a few light moments with the delegations from Mali and Morocco.

On Saturday morning I observed the installation of their Worshipful Masters. The Grand Master used to perform all the installations himself but, with significantly more than 100 Lodges this became far too onerous. They opted for a single event. and more than 100 new Masters were installed at the same time. The Grand Master read the work from the East while the outgoing Masters demonstrated all the signs, grips and words to their successors. It was intriguing, but I still prefer our more personal approach and can't see us changing it any time soon. In America, incidentally, each Lodge installs their own Worshipful Master.

Saturday afternoon was a grand occasion with all the visiting delegations being received with much

pomp and ceremony. We witnessed the Grand Master, MW Bro Julio Meirinhos, being installed for a second term with some 800 to 1,000 Brethren present.



Over lunch, incidentally. I had a most interesting discussion with RW Bro Deepash Letap of India. They have 28,000 members covering 25 religious sects and 33 languages - and they are currently growing at 15%! Their average age has dropped from over 70 to 46.

At the Grand Banquet I had the privilege of sitting on the main table with the Grand Masters of Portugal and France and I spent most of the evening interacting with the Grand Masters of Ireland and Washington. Once again, the input from such esteemed Freemasons really is invaluable to our Grand Lodge.

Another Brother who I spent valuable time with was the Grand Master of Israel, MW Bro Avi Baranes.



A group of us recently visited Israel and our tour included a most memorable evening with the Holy Land Lodge. As MW Bro Avi Baranes

was away at the time, I was formally received by the Past Grand Master, MW Bro Nadim Mansour. Avi and I were able to catch up on our touring group's experiences and I just hope that he came out of our discussion fully aware as to how appreciative we were.

Our Masonic tour of Israel is reported on in a separate article. Let me just say, though, that it way surpassed all of our very highest expectations.

Masonic travel and meeting foreign Brothers really is a special privilege afforded to us and I can't exhort each of you strongly enough to enjoy it whenever you are presented with the opportunity. You will not only gain much Masonic knowledge, but will also form friendships which will last you a lifetime.

The tour was led by Henda Heyneke and on arrival in Tel Aviv we were introduced to our local Tour Guide, Lazarus, who raced us off to our first scheduled visit to Jaffa - and set the hectic pace for 10 unforgettable days.

The "In the Footsteps of Freemasonry" tour covered areas of Masonic, Religious, Cultural, Political and Historical interest, whilst taking in the various social and sightseeing attractions that Israel offers.

The tour began on the Mediterranean Coast in Tel Aviv and took us to Caesarea, Acre, Tzefat, the Golan Heights, Galilee and Tiberius before finally reaching Jerusalem. From Jerusalem we visited Bethlehem in the West Bank, and also spent a day visiting the Dead Sea region and Masada.

A special highlight was an official Grand Lodge



visit to Tel Aviv's Holy Land Lodge where we were very well received by the immediate Past Grand Master of

Israel, MW Bro Nadim Mansour. They presented most interesting and informative lectures about Freemasonry



in Israel and the history of their Grand Lodge. After exchanging greetings and gifts we all enjoyed a formal Festive Board in the company of wives and partners. As most Israeli Lodges were in recess at the time of our visit, other informal visits were arranged around the country with Brethren from various Lodges.

Some of the many highlights of the trip included visits to the Ayalon Institute pre state underground bullet factory, the Knight's Halls in Acco, ancient Synagogues and alleyways in Tzefat, a boat ride on the

Sea of Galilee, visits to the war trenches of the Golan Heights whilst looking over Syria, the River Jordan baptismal site, Nazareth and the Church of Annunciation, the Western Wall, taking part in a

Shabat Dinner, visiting the Mount of Olives and the Garden of Gethsemane, the Garden Tomb and a suggested



site of the crucifixion *Inside King Solomon's Quarries* of Jesus, Bethlehem in the West Bank and the Church of Nativity, attending a sound and light spectacular at the Tower of David, visiting the underground Western Wall (Kotel) tunnels, following the Via Dolorosa to the Church of the Holy Sepulchre and Christ's Tomb, visiting Zedekiah's Cave (King Solomon's Quarries) where the first Masonic Lodge in the Holy land met in 1873, the Holocaust Memorial Museum, ascending Masada by cable car, swimming in the Dead Sea, hiking to the Ein Gedi waterfall oasis, visiting the Old City of Jerusalem including Jewish, Christian and Arab Quarters and shopping at bustling, colourful markets.

This Holy Land Tour was truly enriching and eye opening and exceeded all

the expectations of the fortunate Brethren and their partners who participated. Sincere thanks to Henda Heyneke for organising the trip and taking good care of us and to our extraordinary Tour Guide, Lazarus Kevorkian, whose objective and informative input made a real difference.

Tribute to Bro Arnold Palmer

A few days ago Bro Arnold Palmer, the golf

immortal, successful business man, devoted family man and dedicated Freemason passed to the Eternal East. Born in 1929 in Pennsylvania (USA), he had a down-to-earth common touch that made him one of the most popular and accessible public figures in modern history.




As a golfer he won 92 professional championships, including 4 Masters, 2 British Opens and 1 US Open. He played in 2 Ryder Cups and was a winning captain.

But above all this, Arnold Palmer was a kind, considerate and admirable human being and a credit to Freemasonry. He played a major role in raising the funds that helped create the Arnold Palmer Hospital for Children and Women in Orlando in the 1980s and took part in numerous other charitable initiatives.

Arnold Palmer belonged to Loyalhanna Lodge No 275 in Latrobe, Pennsylvania and was a 33rd degree in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction of the AASR.

Visit to Cameroon - 10th September 2016.
