The AGM and Installation Weekend

Saturday 8th July 2017 was a very big day in the history of the Grand Lodge of South Africa. We not only hosted the Annual Meetings of Grand Lodge and Northern Division, but also held the installations of MW Bro Dave Duncan as our new Grand Master and RW Bro Peet Roos as a new Provincial Grand Master.

In the morning Northern Division had their AGM. RW Bro Alan van der Vyver was in the Chair and he not only managed an excellent meeting, but also read an Annual Report which would make anybody proud. The Division has gone from strength to strength under Alan's leadership - and it showed!

Once the regular proceedings had been attended to, the Grand Master, MW Bro Geoff



Edwards OSM accepted the gavel and then proceeded with the installation ceremony of RW Bro Peet Roos as the new Provincial Grand Master. While he has a very different style to his predecessor, Peet is

an experienced Mason who is well respected by his Brethren. While he follows in some big footsteps, he is expected to leave his own impressive legacy.

The afternoon's proceedings started with the reception of visiting Grand Lodges. These included England, Ireland, Scotland, Western Australia,

Togo, Benin, Guinea, Mali, Mauritius, Ghana, Mozambique and Nigeria. There were 5 visiting Grand Masters present and they were all included, later, as members of the Escort of Honour.

After MW Bro Geoff Edwards OSM had read his report and presented such awards as the Secretary of the Year to Wor Bro Frik Brits of Grand Lodge and Albert J Haak, the main event, the installation of MW Bro Dave Duncan OSM, by the outgoing Grand Master, then took place.

New Grand Master's Inaugural Address



Martin Luther King, on 28th August 1963 at the Lincoln Memorial, delivered his famous "I have a dream" speech in which he revealed his vision for the future of his people in America. In his speech he challenged the prevailing norms perceptions and existing in society at that time. While his speech was enthusiastically received by his followers, most

society discounted it as "the impossible dream". On 25th May 1961, John F Kennedy, in a speech before Congress unveiled his dream of seeing an American being the first man to walk on the moon, and set an objective that this must happen by the end of the decade. Was this another "impossible dream"?

Neither man alone could make it happen, but both men knew that if you do not have goal as a leader, you cannot mobilise people to work to a common objective. Not everyone will sign up, but if the goal is perceived as worthy, enough will lend their skills and abilities to make it happen.

Neither man lived to see their goal achieved, but the inspiration that they created lived on and history has been written.

Kennedy's dream was realised when, less than 9 years later, on the 20th July 1969, Neil Armstrong walked on the Moon. He, along with Buzz Aldrin, a Freemason, was part of the crew that landed a space craft with the processing power equivalent to two IBM XT notebook computers. They had achieved so much with computing power that is miniscule when compared to the power contained in even the simplest of cell phones readily available today. What placed a man on the moon, has since been developed exponentially and its use simplified to such an extent, that my 7-year-old great grandchild has complete confidence with computing power beyond my imagination - and her understanding.

Kennedy's dream was focussed on an event, but the consequences have been life changing for all of us. Would the technology that we take for granted today have been available if John Kennedy had not had his "*impossible dream*"?

The dream of Martin Luther King has not yet been realised and this shows the difference between the nature of the goals. The "man on the moon" project was a material goal and by throwing limitless resources at it; success could be achieved relatively quickly. Martin Luther King's goal is based on attitude and behaviour and no matter how willing the few are, the masses take time to come to terms with new concepts of thought. A whole raft of laws has been promulgated in an attempt to make King's dream come true; but progress has been relatively slow as one cannot legislate a change of attitude.

When we consider organised Freemasonry, we all know that we belong to the greatest fraternal organisation ever created by man; but is it doing what it really should be doing?

In times long past, Freemasonry counted amongst its members, the movers and shakers of society. These were the leaders in their societies and they proudly admitted their membership of the Order. In South Africa this has included, State Presidents, senior Clergymen, Teachers, Lawyers, Industrialists, Entrepreneurs and many of the senior Civil Servants who were responsible for creating the infrastructure of South Africa when it emerged from being a colony to become the industrial powerhouse of Africa. Freemasons were known to their communities, because they were involved in them. Freemasonry was seen, at that time, as a "force for good in society".

Over time this changed and today we are often seen to be little more than a nefarious organisation with lots to hide. We are the butts of attack for every small-minded clergyman who wants to unite his flock by creating the "enemy without". For too long we have not reacted to these claims of wrong doing; hoping that they would go away. It can be suggested however, that the exact opposite has happened.

I suggest that to restore the respect for our Order and reclaim our rightful place in society, we must be actively involved in that society. We must go out and fly the flag at every opportunity and be recognised for the positive contribution that we are quietly making behind the scenes. Sadly, perception is reality and is often more powerful than fact and so we cannot talk to the bigots; we must demonstrate to the open minded as to whom we are and the good that we are doing.

Brethren; it is not just a marketing opportunity that we need to create; we need to structure the activities in our Lodges to involve each and every one of us in "making a positive difference within our community". We must live by those beautiful sentiments portrayed in our ritual; "There is no man so devoid of power or opportunity that he cannot do much for the good of his fellows. May you so know yourself that using aright those talents wherewith God has blessed you, you may do much good in your day and generation, and have little cause to regret work done amiss, or opportunities neglected".

Charity is often perceived as giving money to a worthy cause. I suggest that this is not the best kind of charity work as it does not create sustainable results and, using a biblical analogy, only "feeds a man for a day". By giving our time and expertise to those in the community who are at the coalface of the provision of life supporting charity, we can help them improve their performance and therefore increase their effectiveness.

We are all Freemasons and, in my opinion, we need to put the promotion of Freemasonry first in everything we do within our communities. The task of rebuilding our image and reputation is enormous and therefore I believe that we need to deploy our resources cooperatively in well designed and productive opportunities to achieve this great aim.

Finally, I would like to leave you with the following thought: "I believe that fundamentally our Lodges are schools of leadership in which we teach the life skills relating to achieving success by the power of empathy and facilitation. We need to mobilise our members to practise and develop these skills by making

a positive contribution to the less fortunate within their local communities and, in so doing, promote a positive image of Freemasonry as a power for good in society".
