Magersfontein and Masonry

Brethren: Today, 2nd March 2019, is a very special day. It is a "birth day" in the truest sense of the word.

For those of us that are privileged to be here; it serves to remind us of several important aspects of life.

It reminds us that there is always hope for a positive future. As we, the old life, wither and pass away, young life springs up to replace us and carry on the messages of Freemasonry that we have tried so hard to bring to the world. Our ritual expresses this beautifully, but we all need to be constantly reminded.

It also reminds us that the principles that we follow are relevant, even in the darkest of hours. The name of this Lodge epitomises this.

Magersfontein was a battle that took place in the Kimberley region on 11th December 1899 in the then independent Orange Free State Republic during the conflict known as the Boer War. The British forces, under Lord Methuen were on their way to relieve the siege of Kimberley and under continuous harassment from the Commandos of Vecht-Generaal De la Rey. This was the second battle in a series of three that came to be known in British history as the *"Black week of the Second Boer War."* The Boers had, yet again, succeeded in delaying the British advance. Lord Methuen was replaced by Lord Roberts who took control and succeeded in lifting the siege. History, of course, has not treated Lord Methuen kindly.

The lessons learned during this period related to how a relatively small detachment of strategically

placed, highly motivated and mobile troops could inflict heavy casualties on a force which was superior in fire power and numbers. Much of this motivation came from the fact that the Boers were fighting for their families and their lives as they knew them, whilst many of their opponents were conscripts fighting for the wishes of a foreign power.

I believe that the name of our new Lodge was chosen to represent the strong Masonic spirit that was shown during those dark days of conflict during the Second Boer War. Many of the participants, including leaders on both sides, were Freemasons. It has been reported that there were many occasions when, under a flag of truce, Freemasons from both sides met together in brotherly love. Peace and harmony were momentarily restored according to Masonic principles. After the meeting, it was back to business as usual.

It is also written that later in the conflict, countless lives were spared in Johannesburg and Pretoria when the Masonic military leaders on both sides, agreed not to fight street by street in those two cities and so spared the local population from the horrendous collateral damage that would have occurred.

We all take an obligation as Freemasons to obey the civil law. When called to action, we have a duty to perform. In line with their obligations, Freemasons heed that call, even where it clashes with some of the basic principles that they believe in - and many have paid the highest price. I believe that most however attempted to perform that duty within the confines of their Masonic principles as best they could and to show brotherly love whenever able to do so. In Masonic history, the activities of Freemasons in the Boer War have a special place in our hearts.

It is interesting to note that after losing the war and experiencing all of the suffering and carnage caused by that conflict, the people of South Africa won the peace. They achieved a measure of independence when the Union of South Africa was created some 10 years later and full self- rule in 1926 under the terms of the Balfour Declaration. Again, Freemasons were involved in this political victory.

I believe that the naming of this Lodge is a fitting memorial to all of the Freemasons that have suffered and died during times of conflict, even though they knew in their hearts that there were better ways of resolving differences.

May Lodge Magersfontein ever be a symbol of these better ways. May the Brethren labour together in peace and harmony and may true Brotherly Love permeate their every decision and activity.

With nearly 37,000 Lodges already in the system, spread all over the world, no other tool comes close.

Amity is also very strict about our privacy, is compliant with laws like GDPR, and is able to work with GrandView in a secure way. One of the ways that Amity and GrandView will work together is to provide you with a digital version of your membership card. "King Solomon's Pass" is a fully digital membership card that can be stored on your phone. It is an approved way to share your membership status in real time. This pass can be used anywhere in the world where you have an internet connection.

Getting back to the email that you should by now have received from Amity, please respond to it! This will establish your account credentials and to use the App simply follow the instructions in the email.

You may also choose to opt out of activating your account, and all of your personal data will then be deleted - but, frankly, this doesn't make good sense. Amity is a ground-breaking tool that all GLSA members are encouraged to use - and is by far the most effective system for ensuring that your visits to another Lodge are approved by the GLSA.
