I hope that we all recognise the origin of the above sentence and can complete it without reference to the ritual. We made a promise, before the Great Architect, to do just that. But do we really honour it?

I have no doubt that every Brother believes that he contributes to the well-being of the Order to the best of his ability. That he goes beyond the expected and really is an exemplary Member who can incite the younger Members to emulation.

But, in the spirit of *"know thyself";* do we critically evaluate our contribution to the Order on a regular basis? Do we consider the impact that our deeds and actions have on other Members of the Order? Do we truly practice Truth, Morality and Brotherly Love in everything we do?

Being a Freemason imposes a responsibility upon each and every Member to be an Ambassador for the Order. We can increase our numbers and hence our impact in civil society by being reference points that *"good men"* can identify with. Not the Order per se; but with each and every one of us. If we behave in a *"uncaring way"*, how do we convince non-Masons to join a *"caring organisation"*.

One of my greatest concerns is that in many cases, we are not always demonstrating the fact that we are a *"caring organisation"*. Times are hard and the economic and social pressures being experienced by many of our Members are going un-noticed by their Brethren in the Lodge. No Brother wants to admit that he needs help or to receive what he may perceive as *"charity"*. But when approached with empathy on a one on one basis, it is often the stimulus that will allow a Brother to unburden himself and receive positive reinforcement by just having a *"shoulder to cry on"*.

The practice of Brotherly love is one of the major attributes that separates Freemasonry from so many other civil and social organisations. If we merely pay lip service to it, we are no different to anybody else.

Brethren; we are special; we are very special. We need to remember this at all times and make sure that we continue to value and practice those distinguishing characteristics that make us so special.

Conflict Resolution

Thousands of books have been written on this subject and professional practitioners make a very good living by advising us on how to resolve conflicts. Freemasonry, however, offers us sage advice for free.

Right at the start of our Masonic journey we are exhorted to "ever be forbearing towards the faults and frailties of a Brother" and to not be self-indulgent.

If we perfected this in our practice of our Masonry, we would eliminate any conflicts within our Lodges. We would truly have created places of peace and tranquillity in which brotherly love would thrive.

But have we? Too many of our Lodges are not places of perfect tranquillity. Petty squabbles occur over issues perceived to be "matters of principle". Who's principle? Ours or those of the Order?

The "I win, you lose" philosophy is at the root of all conflict situations. We all pride ourselves as being real Freemasons and of being members of the greatest Fraternity that has ever existed but, like it or not, far too many conflicts still occur.

For me, the Lodge has always been a place to which I can escape from the negative influences of everyday life. It is a sanctuary in which I can seek peace and tranquillity. It is a place where I can develop my life skills in a benign environment filled with support and encouragement and not recrimination.

The basis of the Order is the Apprentice degree, which promotes the concept that you cannot make progress towards enlightenment unless you know yourself. Do we review our behaviour and attitudes often enough in terms of the fundamental issues of tolerance and self-indulgence?

Brethren, this basic awareness is critical if we are to create true harmony in our Lodges.

This comes to mind when considering our Supreme Council's extensive efforts to raise the spectre of the AASR for South Africa's standing amongst the African and Global Supreme Councils and the most successful visit to attend the Supreme Council for Germany's 2019 AGM in Berlin at the beginning of March. Attended by all the Central, Northern and Eastern European, as well as four African Supreme Councils, South Africa was warmly greeted as we attended for the first time in many years.

The attendance of the AASR for South Africa again highlighted that Supreme Council activities around the world are healthy and active and our delegation was engaged on numerous issues pertaining to Freemasonry in South Africa and Africa. It really is both important and encouraging to realise how valuable a member we are considered to be by this international



Masonic community. This, of course, demands that we strive to improve the standards of our Order at every possible opportunity and to ensure that we are worthy of the respect extended to us as a Sovereign Supreme Council.

The full weekend of activities, saw some 40 Supreme Councils with over 120 delegates attending the German AASR AGM which was held on Saturday 2 March 2019. Highlighting the importance with which South Africa is today viewed, the Sovereign Grand

Commander of Germany, MP Bro Eberhard Desch. who is also the Chairman of the European Supreme Confederation, Councils awarded our Sovereign Grand Commander, MP Bro Boet du Plessis 33°. Honorary ASSR for Germany membership. This is a rare honour indeed and one that was



not extended to any other participating country present.

To further emphasise our expanding relations, The SGIG for Central Germany Bro Peter Hochreiter 33°, was given Honorary membership of our Supreme Council in reciprocity of Puis Bro Vic Mühlenbeck's appointment as Grand Representative to Germany, thus further deepening the bilateral relations of the ASSR for South Africa.

Ordering Lodge Aprons via Grand Lodge

Grand Lodge has established an effective working relationship with a Pakistani manufacturer of Masonic regalia. The aprons, for example, are all made of genuine lambskin and the detail is superb. If you are interested in obtaining a quotation, we will require:

• A close up, high resolution image of your current apron with exact dimensions of the apron, the flap and the ribbon borders.

• The pantone colour of the ribbon borders.

• A high resolution, digital image of your Lodge Logo (if required to be embroidered on the apron) with pantone colours of all logo items.

• Any other distinguishing details that need to be described (eg - silver tassels and t bars).

You should be able to identify the colours at any reputable printing company with a pantone colour chart.

While this all may sound onerous, it is a once-off exercise that will never have to be repeated. The details can be saved against your Lodge records and any future orders of the same item will be a very simple process.

- We were asked whether there is a GrandView App available. The good news is that, while there is no App as such, GrandView is optimised to run on any mobile device just using portal.grandlodge.co.za. The look and feel may differ somewhat, but the functionality is exactly the same.
- The basic Introductory package comprising the set of articles Introducing Freemasonry and the GLSA and the Application Form are now available to every GrandView user. Log in, go to your "Home" page, click on "Resources" and there, filed under "Candidate" are "Introducing Freemasonry" and the latest "Membership Application Form". Download them and send them to your prospective applicant.
- As an additional service to our Brethren we will be creating a GLSA Contact list which will be readily available to every GrandView user. This will be updated monthly, will include details for each and every member and will contain such information as Name, Lodge, Mobile No and eMail Address.
- GrandView is in the process of releasing a new version of their package which includes several enhancements which should be beneficial to us. These include more structure in the filing of Masonic Resources, additional flexibility with regard to recruitment and several new reporting options. This release will be implemented over the weekend starting Friday 12th April. We've also been assured that the examination module will soon be completed for imminent release.
