Is it a Journey or an Expedition?

Our ritual tells us that life is like a journey. A journey on which we will meet with many challenges that will enable us to develop our self-knowledge.

During life, we will undertake many physical journeys. These will be defined by a known destination. A beginning in the now and a known end point. Can you buy a ticket when you cannot specify the physical destination?

An expedition however needs only a purpose or an intention. An expedition is a journey into the unknown. In our case, it is the search for selfknowledge. It is a journey to an unknown destination, as we will never be sure as to when we have achieved the ultimate goal of perfection.

Freemasonry exhorts every Brother to undertake this journey with faith. Faith in his own ability to discover his own ultimate destination. It is a personal journey in which a guide can only provide support, not direction.

The biggest challenge that many of our members face, having come from a rigid and structured education system where imagination is discouraged, is the ability to shed the expectation of being spoon-fed. We may be guilty of using the term "Masonic Education" lightly as, in traditional terms, it can be construed as being Masonic schooling. It is true that the principles and tenets of the Order can be taught formally, but the true essence of the Order cannot. Each Brother must undertake his own expedition of discovery and improve himself in such a way that he is happy with the result. My result will definitely be different to yours, and so how can I "*teach you*".

The Grand Lodge is looking at a formalised "*mentoring*" program to aid those who are genuinely searching for self-knowledge. These "*Mentors*" will not be teachers; they will be guides. They will respond in the spirit of our ritual which indicates that "who, *when earnestly consulted about the way which is to be travelled, always answers*".

The emphasis is on the "earnestly consulted" because we cannot force any Brother to undertake his expedition. If a Brother sits passively waiting for guidance, it will not come. It cannot come, because the guide is not aware of his particular need. It is the requirement of every Brother who is undertaking his expedition of self-knowledge to seek whatever HE personally needs.

Because there is no one correct answer on a journey of emotions, the Brother will need to consult many guides. The more views and interpretations to which he can expose himself, the more he will increase the confidence with which he will make his next decision. A decision that will most probably shape his future. Remember, there are many cross-roads on the journey of life. "Freemasonry requires that the Brother does not just know much but comprehends what he has learned. What man is, and what man may become."

Brethren: Freemasonry offers you a hand intended to facilitate you in undertaking the expedition of selfdiscovery. Take advantage of it; *"it will be of service to you when."*

FreeMasons Love Tradition!

GLSA PGL Northern Division Officers seldom attend Scottish installations, let alone with a contingent of 9 Brethren. It is even more unusual to have a GLSA Presiding Master acting as Senior Warden at the same installation - but this is what happened when Wor Bro Paul Nash was installed as the Worshipful Master of Lodge Golden Thistle (Scottish Constitution).

For the past 130 years the Presiding Masters of Lodges Star of the Rand (GLSA) and Johannesburg (UGLE) have filled the offices of the 2 Wardens at Lodge Golden Thistle's Installation. This arrangement is reciprocated between the 3 Lodges involved. This tradition started 131 years ago when the Charter Master of Lodge Golden Thistle was out of the country at the time of their installation and the Charter Master of Lodge Star of the Rand was symbolically installed in his stead. The 3 Lodges jointly owned the temple in Plein Street in Johannesburg and there remains a close relationship between them. With a GLSA Past Master, Wor Bro Paul Nash, being installed as Master of Golden Thistle, this relationship can only get stronger and the support from PGL Northern Division and Lodge Star of the Rand on the night made this look like it could easily have been a GLSA installation. Long may the close bonds continue!

GrandView for Dummies

You are all extremely aware by now of our implementation of GrandView, a Masonic Membership

Platform developed in the USA. The system now services 27 Jurisdictions with over 4,500 Lodges and 410,000 members. It has already proved of major benefit to the GLSA



as far as our administration is concerned - and the challenge now is to get more and more of our Brethren enjoying the Masonic benefits that GrandView offers.

In this brief article we will try to help you, as an individual Brother, to explore the information which is now available to you - but the first step is to make sure that you are registered on GrandView. Once you are, you may now log in regularly, by clicking on this link:

https://portal.grandlodge.co.za/users/sign_in

You then enter your unique password after which we suggest that you perform the following:

- Check all of your personal details, such as your name, address, contact nos, email address and make any adjustments online.
- Update your partner / spouse's details.
- Include a photo suitable .jpg of yourself.
- Review your Memberships, History and Offices and note any corrections needed. Send these in an email to your PGL Secretary and, after he has validated them, he will forward them to the Grand Secretary for updating.
- Click on "Home" at the top of your screen.
- You will now be given all the postings to GrandView in the most recent few weeks. Keep abreast of these as they will provide invaluable information for you. Check for any new updates on a regular basis.
- Click on "Resources" on right of screen.
- It shows "Candidate", "Entered Apprentice", "Fellowcraft" and "Master Mason" and you gain access to material for which you qualify.
- Under "Candidate", you will find the package given to all new GLSA applicants. Familiarise yourself with this, so that you are able to answer any questions that are put to you.
- Under each degree level you will find the latest version of the related Sections from the Book of Life. Make sure that you are familiar with this material. It is a Masonic gold mine that every single Brother should benefit from.
- Also on right, you will see "Masonic Exams". The Entered Apprentice Test has been loaded and you are welcome to try it. We are waiting, however, for the release of the assessment component so that we may implement it.
