Journey or Destination?

As leaders of the Craft, we often pose the above question. The reason for this is in an attempt to reveal one of the true intentions of the Order.

It is a simple context through which we can facilitate the Member to think about what he is experiencing, what he wants to experience and where it fits into the greater scheme of things in his life.

Whilst our Masonic literature explains the journey of Freemasonry as a personal voyage to self-knowledge, we still have some who treat it as a race. "How long will it take to become a Master Mason?" is often heard in the formative years of a young Brother. "Why are some Brethren going through their Degrees quickly and I have to wait?"

Our Constitution allows a Brother to elevate from Initiate to Master Mason in 6 months. Why should a Brother not therefore avail himself of this opportunity? Why does his Mentor make him wait, whilst others are seen to "progress"?

The answer lies in the personal definition of "progress" and differs from member to member. Some just want the Master Mason's certificate in order to be able to wear a ring, give the handshake and connect with other Masons for selfish motives. Fortunately, these Brethren are relatively few and soon find out that their lack of knowledge of the Order becomes a major embarrassment to them. The good Brethren they are trying to connect with, soon recognise them for what they are and tend to avoid them. It is not about calling yourself a "Master Mason", it is about living like one!

It is also in our Constitution that a Brother must prove his proficiency before he is elevated to the next Degree. It is essential that he creates a solid platform upon which to build his personality through his Masonic experience, and failing to do so will see him disillusioned and leaving the Order. Do 4 meetings, one being his initiation, qualify him to become a Fellowcraft and then likewise, another 3 meetings to become Master Mason? In the days of our formation, some 300 years ago, an Apprentice Stone Mason served 7 years of full-time endeavour before he was entrusted with any decision-making authority. Now it is 7 months of part-time attendance. Have we lost the plot?

As many will know, there is a part in the ceremony of passing where the Apprentice is congratulated on his progress; is this a lie? Sadly; in many cases it is.

The principles and tenets of Freemasonry have been well tried and tested throughout the centuries and found to be worthy. We believe that they are still as relevant today as they were then. But how can an understanding of them be acquired in so short a time as 6 months? Some of us have spent decades trying to live those principles and still don't claim to fully understand them. Has our vision of the measure of "proficiency" become so blurred that we do not care anymore? Have 7 meetings now become enough to be a Freemason?

Proficiency has to be measured in terms of an understanding of Freemasonry and not just by the efflux of time. Many Lodges are encouraging their younger Brethren to write a paper before they are allowed to progress, thus demonstrating that they are starting to understand and question the meaning of Freemasonry and showing that they have acquired the thought processes that will enable them to benefit from their journey of discovery. The discovery of a mental state in which they can develop themselves. A realm where ego is subdued and brotherly love promoted. Where kindness and tolerance replace bitterness and reproach. Where a good word is always given about a Brother and when there is nothing good to say, silence is respected.

It may sound idealistic and maybe I am an idealist; but, for me, this is what Freemasonry is all about. It is what we must strive to achieve in all our interactions. It is about learning to understand ourselves in such a way that we can correct that which in us, in a moral sense, is undesirable. Of creating in ourselves someone who will be respected as a force for good in our personal environment and role model for the generation to come.

In this way, Freemasonry will make a difference.
