Are We at War Again?

Watching the celebrations in Europe for the 75th Anniversary of the ending of the World War II in Europe on 8th May 1945 and the countless TV programs depicting the heroism of those who fought and gave their all for the ongoing freedom of their fellow men, I could not help but feel pride for those South Africans who volunteered to fight for a principle. There was no conscription in South Africa in 1940 and so each of the 334,000 South Africans, from all cultural groups, who joined up were volunteers. They made a choice.

South Africans served with distinction in most of the campaigns that took place on the African continent and made a real contribution, both on the ground and in the air, to Mussolini's defeat in East Africa in 1941. The significance of this victory was that it removed a hostile force from the rear of the fight against the Axis in North Africa. They also fought in the horrors of Italy and many other Southern Africans fought in the Battle of Britain. Perhaps a less remembered campaign, was that to liberate Madagascar in 1942.

Many of these combatants were Freemasons and even more were the fathers and grandfathers of present members. It is only right that we should recognise the sacrifice that they made to save the world from a totalitarian regime. The records of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission show that they look after the graves of over 11,023 South Africans, from all cultural groups, who made the ultimate sacrifice on behalf of each and every one of us who followed after them. As Freemasons, I believe that we are still fighting for a principle. Whilst we are no longer armed, we nevertheless employ our resources to the cause of social justice and the preservation of a moral way of life. We cannot change everything in our society, but we can make a difference, person by person, family by family.

The war against the SARS virus that has created Covid-19 is being fought on the streets of South Africa. Just as in 1940, when the country was divided on whether it was our problem or not, the public spirited Brethren in some of our Lodges have responded by becoming involved in making a contribution to relieving the hardship caused to persons who were already living on the edge of economic viability and are now desperate. We salute these Brethren and the choice that they have made. We hope that many more Brethren will follow their initiative, accept the responsibility to demonstrate the universal principle of Brotherly Love and follow their example in showing that we believe that we are a force for good in our greater society.

Brethren, it does not matter what your political beliefs are, when a national crisis arises, it affects us all. In 1906, Alfred Henry Lewis stated, "There are only nine meals between mankind and anarchy". With this period of lockdown in a social environment, where a significant proportion of the population live on a hand to mouth basis, there are many South Africans who go to bed hungry each night. The consequences for the peace in our society may be grave.

Just as our heroic forebears rose to the challenge in a time of crisis, I appeal to each and every Lodge and each and every Brother to make a positive contribution to the "Covid-19 war effort" and so help to "make a difference", one person at a time.

S&C's 8 year Journey!

The very first edition of the Square and Compasses was released in August 2012 and was an initiative of our present Grand Master, MW Bro Dave Duncan OSM. It is now produced by MW Bro Geoff Edwards OSM and can proudly claim to have never missed a month!

In this "Centennial" edition we recall a few of the highlights from the first 99 releases and hope that you will enjoy sharing these memories with us..

In September 2012, MW Bro Ronnie Bauser OSM was presented with his 60 year jewel by then Grand Master, MW Bro Watty Watson. The presentation was at Peace and Harmony in Kimberley, which was RW Bro Bauser OSM's



Mother Lodge. RW Bro Bauser was Grand Master from 1991 to 1997 and passed away in January 2018.



In April 2013, we reported on MW Bro Sidney Gasson OSM's passing to the Eternal East. He had been our Grand Master from 1973 to 1983 and was highly respected for the contribution that he made to the ongoing success of our Grand Lodge. He was well loved for his qualities as a man and as a Freemason. He was a

member of Lodge Aurora in the Free State.

In the early 1800s the de Goede Hoop Temple and the British (UGLE) Temple were separated by the short Neeuwemeester's Laan. It was custom that the Lodges elected their new Master's on the same night and that de Goede Hoop's Brethren then proceeded down the lane where the Master's were introduced at the gate.

While British Temple is now much further away,

the gate is still there and the tradition continues. In this June 2013 picture we have Wor Bros Evangelos Doucas (de Goede Hoop) and Nick Evans (British) at the gate.

In November 2013 we included a report on a very successful GLSA AGM. There were a number of foreign guests, but none more welcome than our very close friend and Brother,

MW Bro Dimitrios Kontesis from Greece.

In December 2013 we sadly acknowledged the passing of MW Bro John Bowen OSM. He had been our Grand Master from 2003 - 2008 and had established our Grand Lodge as a real presence in Africa. MW Bro Bowen had been a member of Koh-I-Noor and, in



his younger years, a very competitive sportsman.

as Grand Master, was Sovereign Grand Commander of the AASR for South Africa
