

Lest We Forget

Although the outbreak of World War I was triggered by the assassination of the Austrian Archduke Franz Ferdinand and his wife in 1914, historians agree that a complex interplay of political, economic and social factors that had developed since the 1870s were the main cause of the war. Initially there was widespread expectation of a rapid and comprehensive victory and few people knew what a war on a general scale might entail. As it became apparent that the war would last longer than it was originally anticipated, the Governments of all the belligerent countries increased their controls over their resources and populations, which led to shortages of basic commodities and the rationing of food. As more and more men were conscripted as soldiers, women had to take on the roles of farmers, miners, clerical and industrial workers.

Albert Joubaire, a French soldier, wrote in his diary after one battle: *What a bloodbath, what horrid images, what a slaughter. Hell cannot be this dreadful.* Many Freemasons were conscripted as soldiers in the war and the *Masonic Times* of Wisconsin reported that during July 1918 a meeting of the Grand Masters of the Grand Lodges of Germany, Austria, Hungary, Turkey, Bulgaria and Finland was held in Berlin to propose a peace initiative to the members of the Grand Lodges in the countries which were fighting against them. If this meeting did take place, then it is doubtful whether it had any effect on the war as none of the leaders of the main countries involved therein were Freemasons. It is estimated that approximately 8.5 million soldiers and 7 million civilians died during the course of World War I. On 11 November 1918 the war finally came to an end. Malnutrition had however left both children and adults vulnerable to infectious diseases like tuberculosis, influenza and pneumonia and the war was hardly over when the World was confronted by a virulent strain of influenza called the "Spanish Flu". By the end of 1919 approximately 21 million people had died from this disease.

Notwithstanding the devastation of the countryside by the war, wild poppies grew on the battlefields of northern France and Flanders and a Canadian military doctor, John McCrae, wrote the now well-known poem: *In Flanders Fields*. The first national day of remembrance, initially called Armistice Day, was held on 11 November 1919 to commemorate all the persons who had lost their lives in World War I. The renowned humanitarian, Moina Michael, was so inspired by McCrae's poem that she decided to wear a red poppy in honour of the soldiers who had died in the war. This then became a tradition and it was Rudyard Kipling, the renowned poet and a Freemason, who coined the phrase *Lest we forget*, which means "For fear that we forget".

South Africans were also affected by World War I. In 1917 more than 600 black South African soldiers died when the troopship, the SS Mendi, sank. More than 11 000 other South African soldiers also died in this war. South African soldiers, many who were Freemasons, also paid the ultimate price in World War II and in numerous armed conflicts thereafter, in Africa and in overseas countries. We still commemorate the memory of these men and women on Remembrance Day in November at the Cenotaphs in towns and cities.

We also commemorate the memory of all the South African uniformed members who have given their lives since 2003 in the service of peace under the auspices of the United Nations, the African Union and other bilateral deployments on the African continent. We do this on the International Day of United Nations Peacekeepers in May at the Wall of Remembrance, which was recently constructed at the De Brug Mobilisation Centre near Bloemfontein and on which the following words are inscribed: *For their deeds they will always be remembered for they served the nation with pride and dignity*.

The red poppy is worn as a symbol in remembrance of those who gave their lives in the struggle to secure and protect our freedom and in the hope for a peaceful future. Let us never forget them.

A Freemason's role in Home Away from Home

Bro Darren Bergman's home is in Pretoria but, being a Politician, he spends a large portion of his time in Cape Town and, as a result, belongs to de Goede Hoop. He is the Shadow Minister of International Relations and Cooperation. As such, in the early phases of the Covid 19 lockdown, he was fielding calls from desperate parents



wanting to know what could be done and who they could phone to try to bring their children home as they were stuck at various foreign locations.

The easiest, and maybe the wisest, decision would have been for him to refer them to the DIRCO emergency consular line and email address and to type out a few press releases attacking government for the mass confusion. He decided, however, that he would rather try to contribute positively to addressing the Covid 19 crisis by assisting his country and our people.

As airports closed and airlines stopped functioning, the challenge got more and more difficult. People were getting stuck abroad and, unless they had a supportive family, they often had no money or resources to assist them in any way. The President then announced a hard lock down. This closed airports but still allowed for the return of citizens across the globe. Minister Mbalula then announced that all ports and borders would be completely closed by 28th March 2020. This meant that all South Africans abroad that had not returned before then, would be locked out of South Africa until the lockdown allowed entry points to be reopened again.

Darren and his small team created a database of those needing help and via whatsapp interacted with them and with a variety of international resources. They enlisted support from local psychologists, interacted and worked with foreign Freemasons, negotiated with foreign governments and implemented various diverse strategies to provide meaningful support. The situation was a nightmare with young children sleeping on the stone floors at closed airports abroad, teachers who had taken lucrative contracts in Asia being told on arrival that the contract was cancelled and many other equally horrendous stories. In many cases, desperation was quickly setting in and counselling was in great demand.

Their non political project was called Home Away from Home and it spanned the globe with volunteers from Switzerland, United States, Canada, Mexico, France, United Kingdom, Kuwait, Malaysia, China and South Africa. They had a huge positive impact on addressing the problem and we really are proud to acknowledge that Darren Bergman is our Brother.

Royal Arch AGM a great Success

The Grand Chapter of the Royal Arch AGM had the same type of challenges as so many of our meetings at present. It would have to be conducted via Zoom and, just in case that wasn't challenging enough, the First Grand Principal, MEC Johan Britz, was in the process of recovering from a back operation.

Covid Feeding Scheme continues

In our September 2020 Newsletter we introduced you to the immediate Past Grand Master's initiative in which we planned to feed 1 000 children for 100 days. MW Bro Dave Duncan OSM has also played a leading role, together with the Provincial Grand Masters, in ensuring that the project is effectively implemented.

We have recently distributed a 2^{nd} batch of food around the various Divisions and thought it would be a good idea to share some feedback with you. These are just three examples of the progress being made.

Senzokuhle Orphanage in La Mercy, KwaZulu

Natal is being run by Elda Ndlovu. She is 80-years old now and started her home some 26 years ago in 1994 and by 1999 there were 67 street children living with her. She is reliant on donations to feed



and clothe the 20 odd children now in her care, ranging from 2 to 18 years old. In September Wor Bro Jeremy

Rundle delivered a batch of clothing and fortified porridge and in November Wor Bro Henry Selzer delivered another batch as the first lot had now run out.

In Northern Division, on Friday 13th November we delivered 150kg of porridge to the Louis Botha Children's home in Pretoria. It was established in 1918 to provide housing and care to children oprhpaned by the "Great Flu Epidemic" and nowadays houses over 100 children, many of whom have been placed there by the courts as a result of being traumatized by abusive behaviour or neglect.

Arising from a similar challenge due to Covid, the Grand Lodge of South Africa decided to initiate a program aimed at feeding 1,000 children for 100 days. Our Lodges were tasked with identifying orphanages and other informal homes where children are cared for and where there are insufficient resources to adequately ensure their proper nourishment and Louis Botha Children's Home was among the beneficiaries.

Freemasonry has worked for hundreds of years to

solve and ease problems in their local communities with the aim of making the world a better place for all mankind. Today in South Africa we have many problems, but none can be more heart wrenching than seeing starving children. The knock-on effects and related health issues become a major problem in society over time and we are privileged to be able



and we are privileged to be able to assist in tackling it.

In Southern Division RW Bro Tommy Hardiman and his team included the Steinthal Kinderhuis as one of the homes to be supported. The Home is just outside of Tulbagh and caters for some 150 children ranging from 2 - 18 years. It started as a Mission many years ago and the Masons have been involved for a number of years now. Tommy and Wor Bro Jacques Maritz visited them to deliver over half a ton of porridge mix and were extremely enthusiastically received.
