Inequality and Freemasonry

The Aim of the Grand Lodge of South Africa is to build a multi-cultural Brotherhood of good men who practice brotherly love, charity and truth and who are united in the enhancement of wisdom, high moral standards, equality and justice for all persons.

Prince Hall was born between 1735 and 1738. By the age of 11 he was enslaved or in the service of a tanner in Boston, America but by 1770 was a free and literate man. He was married and worked as a peddler, caterer and leather worker and later owned his own leather shop. He was a leader in the free black community in Boston and was attracted to Freemasonry because he heard that it was founded upon the ideals of liberty, equality and peace. He applied to join St John's Lodge in Boston but was rejected, possibly because he was black. He and fifteen other black men then applied to join a military Lodge which was attached to the British forces stationed in Boston. He was duly initiated in Lodge No. 441, which was under the Grand Lodge of Ireland. He thereafter served in the Revolutionary War and he and other black freedmen later petitioned the Grand Lodge of England to form a lodge for black Freemasons. This Charter was duly granted and they formed the first Lodge for black members in 1784 and called it African Lodge No. 1. Due to its popularity and Prince Hall's leadership, the Grand Lodge of England appointed him as a Provincial Grand Master in 1791. He later formed similar Lodges in Philadelphia and Rhode Island and died in 1807. In 1827 the African Lodge declared its independence from England and all other Lodges and shortly thereafter it was renamed the Prince Hall Grand Lodge. Prince Hall is renowned for his role in promoting equal education, the abolition of slavery and is recognised as one of the most influential black leaders in America during the late 1700s.

At about the same time in Europe, the continued inequality amongst the people of France resulted in widespread social distress and saw the outbreak of the French Revolution in 1789 under the slogan of liberty, equality, fraternity. Though anti-slavery sentiments were widespread by this time, slavery was only abolished in France in 1794, in all the northern states of America by 1804, in Britain and her colonies in 1833, in certain eastern European countries in 1948 and in Mauritania in 1981. Akin to the inequality caused by slavery and racism is the absence of universal suffrage which gives the right to vote to all adult citizens regardless of wealth, income, gender, social status, race, ethnicity, politics etc. While the 1800s saw many international movements advocating universal suffrage, South Africa only introduced it in 1994.

It seems that notwithstanding the lofty ideals of Freemasonry, certain members have, over the past approximately 300 years, not abided by nor defended these ideals as actively or as strongly as they could have done. As modern Freemasons it is therefore our duty to confront and eradicate inequality wherever we encounter it. While we may not encounter slavery and while we may enjoy universal suffrage, there is still some inequality present in certain lodges. This may be caused by Brethren whose inflated egos have seen them forget or neglect to adhere to and comply with the Golden Rule, namely to "do unto others as you would they do unto you". As we take our obligations on the VSL, it is relevant to refer to certain verses contained therein in this regard. Proverbs 22 teaches us that the rich and the poor die together for the Great Architect of the Universe is the maker of them all. Micah 6 teaches us to do justice, to love kindness and to be humble. Acts 17 teaches us that God made all races and nations and that we are all equal in the sight of God.

As modern Freemasons we must therefore actively confront and eradicate racism, which is defined as prejudice, discrimination or antagonism by an individual, community or institution against a person or people on the basis of their membership of a particular racial or ethnic group. The United Nations Convention states that superiority based on racial differentiation is morally condemnable, socially unjust and is an example of extreme inequality. Let us therefore strive to ensure that Freemasonry is no longer tainted by inequality.

Most of the Diamond members live closer to Jagersfontein than they did to Kimberley so, as far as they are concerned, it's a match made in heaven.

Just to make certain that the original Lodge Jagersfontein doesn't get forgotten in the excitement, they will be hanging its charter in the museum.
