Masonic Brotherhood

We first read about the concept of brotherhood in the book of Genesis in the VSL where Cain murdered Abel, in a jealous rage. When God later asked Cain where Abel was, he replied: *Am I my brother's keeper?* Throughout the long history of the World, we learn that man has been involved in almost constant strife and adversity, many times with his brothers and there are a large number of references in recorded history of the concept of brotherhood. There are also many modern definitions of brotherhood, being a relationship between biological brothers; or a feeling of kinship with or a closeness to a group of people; or an association of people who are linked by a common interest, etc.

As Freemasons, we are taught that most of the ancient stone masons were illiterate and to protect their trade and the knowledge which they acquired, they developed other methods of communicating with each other, like the use of oral traditions and special signs, grips and words. By doing so, they appear to have established an association of persons who were linked by a common interest, which later developed into a brotherhood of operative masons.

For the past 300 years Freemasons have referred to each other as brothers and the terms brotherhood, brotherly love and fraternity are frequently used in Masonic Lodges and yet, the members in a single Lodge may not even be friends with each other outside of their Masonic commitments. If such members are neither biological brothers nor social friends, then it seems that their only bond or link is the feeling of

kinship or association based on a common interest. Fortunately, in most cases this bond is not only enough but may be far stronger than the bonds of family or social friendship and we often find that this unlikely band of brothers can truly claim to be a Masonic brotherhood. To maintain and strengthen this kinship or association, it is however important that the members know why they are members of this brotherhood.

From our initiation, we are encouraged to become better men by reading and understanding the VSL, by regularly attending our Lodge meetings, by learning the Masonic rituals, by reading the Masonic educational material which is provided to us, by participating in social and fund raising activities, by visiting other Lodges and by simply doing to others as we would have them do to us. We are taught that this developmental journey may take our whole lives to accomplish. When we however begin to succeed in becoming better men, we find that we also begin to become better believers, better husbands, better fathers, better employers, better colleagues, better brothers and better friends and we then begin helping to make the World a better place for humankind to live in peace and harmony.

If this is the common interest of all our members, then there should be no disagreements amongst them. The absence of stress and strife in any Lodge will ensure its peace and harmony and will make the membership of that Lodge irresistible. When our members further openly share this interest with their families and friends, then the curiosity of non-Freemasons, who always want to know why we are part of this Masonic brotherhood, will also become satisfied. The concept of brotherhood therefore excludes isolation and the well-known saying that unity is strength, should become the unofficial motto of every Lodge.

Faith, hope and charity are forces within the reach of all men and if they are applied in an association of men, like our Masonic brotherhood, then we must use these forces to exercise an immense power for good in our World. As we actively encourage the increase of our faith, promote hope and practice charity, we will develop brotherly love which will not only cement us together as a group, but it's very concept will remind us of our true relationship to the GAOTU and to humankind, which includes our non-Masonic brothers and sisters. The relief which we must offer must therefore not be restricted to our charitable donations, but it must also be visible in our efforts in lightening the burden of human suffering by our own correct way of living. Unlike the biblical Cain, let us therefore continue to strive, as members of a global Masonic brotherhood, to always be our brother's keeper.

The Mentoring Program



VW Bro Simon Nash is the Deputy Provincial Grand Master of the Northern Division. He is a highly committed Freemason who really enjoys Masonic Education and the opportunity to help with the personal development of his Brethren. He introduced the "Masonic Mentoring Program" to the GLSA almost 3 years ago and in this article, outlines his progress.

We have all missed our ceremonial meetings this last year, and while we are enjoying returning to labour, there are still elements of our Masonic activities that are very effectively through the use of Zoom technology. One such initiative is the Grand Lodge Mentoring Program. Over the past year the "Mentoring to make a difference" sessions on Zoom have been well received by Brethren all around the country and will continue to be held monthly on the dates listed hereafter.

What is Mentoring? In the Masonic context it should, in simple terms, mean that the process of the Preparator guiding the candidate through the journeys in the 1st, 2nd and 3rd degrees is continued outside of the ritual working, and that no Brother is ever left to fend for himself on his Masonic Journey. **The objective is to ensure that the Brother's expectations on joining the Order continue to be met.**

The Mentoring Program takes a very practical look at the symbolism and ritual of Freemasonry and applies it to the Brother's wheel of life to assist him to become the better man we promised that he could be, while at the same time focussing his Masonic journey on achieving the objectives he set himself on joining the Order. The sessions are aimed at both Mentee and Mentor and provide a comprehensive introduction to Mentoring and the lessons of the 1st degree. The role of the personal Mentor is emphasised as assisting the new Brother to integrate into the Lodge and to act as guide on his Masonic journey. Teaching the Apprentice how the Lodge functions and about Masonic protocol are also dealt with by the Mentor and, using the Mentoring Program, the Mentor can assist the Apprentice to balance his wheel of life and become a better man.

Mentoring for the Fellowcraft is currently being drafted and is near completion, where after the Master Mason Mentoring material will be developed.

The reaction to the Mentoring Program has been very positive, with experienced Freemasons such as RW Bro Johan Britz regularly participating. The participants have confirmed the program's success.

Orange is our 1st Installation for 15 months



Mentoring Young Entrepreneurs


